Leaving a Legacy of Philanthropy

The Sobrato family has worked for years – for generations, actually – to create a culture and legacy of philanthropy for their family. In the beginning, they were like most people and did not have a specific plan for their giving. However, as their wealth increased and the younger generations got involved in both business and philanthropy, the need for a clear vision and strategy for their giving became evident. The Sobrato Family Foundation was created 25 years ago, and conversations about the impact and legacy of their charitable works continue to this day.



On May 19, 2022, The Catholic Community Foundation’s annual Capstone Advisor Session featured a conversation with three generations of the Sobrato family – John A., John M. and John Matthew Sobrato. They discussed the roots of their philanthropy, how they engage the younger generation, the future of the Sobrato Organization, how they think about impact, and more.

While the scope and scale of the Sobratos’ giving is atypical, the lessons they’ve learned can be applied to people of all giving levels.

Creating a Family Culture of Philanthropy

Most people learn best by doing, and that holds true with philanthropy. The Sobrato family is encouraging the youngest generation to be philanthropic in their early twenties, and the conversations about giving back and gratitude start much younger. Make giving a habit – whether it’s giving money or time – and talk about it too. You never know what you might learn from the younger generation. Through the input of the younger generations, the Sobratos’ philanthropy has expanded beyond local issues, and they have begun thinking deeply about the intersections and alignment of their business and philanthropy. **“They care about things I never would have thought of,”** said John A. Sobrato about his grandchildren who are now becoming more engaged with the family’s philanthropy. When the older generation has a philanthropic direction set, it can be difficult to get younger generations invested in participating. If there is

no room for new ideas, people quickly become disengaged. The Sobratos decided to address this issue by not locking all the money into collective giving. Some money but instead giving individuals the latitude to donate to the causes they care about in addition to giving toward collective goals. **“[We thought] if we create enough individual philanthropic freedom, it would be a lot easier to keep at least half of [our giving] together,”** said John M. Sobrato during the panel discussion. **“And so far, that’s worked.”** Having a plan is important, but the best thing to do is get started. John Matthew advised the audience not to get stuck in *“analysis paralysis.”* There is no silver bullet that will solve the complex issues in our society today. **“Ultimately, get involved,”** said John Matthew. **“People are suffering in the here and now, and you can be helpful to them today.”**

1 Make a Plan

Create a clear vision for your current philanthropy. If applicable, start a conversation with your spouse, children, etc. about your goals and hopes for your giving. What causes do you care about? How much do you want to give each year? What vehicles best serve your philanthropy today? Create a plan for your current philanthropy so you can achieve your goals and make an impact today. 2 Get Involved (and Get Your Kids Involved)

If you’d like the values of philanthropy and gratitude to be passed on to the next generation, there’s no better time to start than now! Here are some ideas:

- Invite your children to volunteer with you twice a year.
- Set aside a certain amount of money and let your grandchildren vote on where it should be donated. Bonus: have each grandchild pick an organization/cause and present it for consideration.
- Open a Donor Advised Fund for each of your children so that they can build up their “charitable equity” and easily make donations to the causes they care about.

3 Think About the Future

A legacy gift is a beautiful reflection of your values after your lifetime. Many people wish they could give more today but are restrained by the expenses of everyday life. Through a legacy gift, you can make significant contributions to causes

A Legacy of Support for Educators

Sara Fogelquist was a dedicated historic preservationist, an avid learner, and a creative educator whose legacy is living on through the efforts of her husband, Andrew Quinn, and the fund he established in her honor. The *Fogelquist Fund for Education* supports local educators by providing funding for specialized tools and resources to enhance student learning. “Our goal is to make sure teachers can access the specialized tools, training, and resources they need to implement their great ideas,” said Andrew.

Andrew drew inspiration from his late wife’s life when designing this fund which supports teachers instead of individual students. “I believe firmly in supporting teachers because we can support one student at a time and that’s wonderful. That will have a great impact,” said Andrew. **“But when you can give a teacher access to the things they need to activate an idea or a hope for their curriculum, their impact is going to spread to all the students they’re teaching, not just that year, but every year moving forward.”**

The board of the Fogelquist Fund has been working hard to raise funds to support their mission. In 2022, the fund reached its first major milestone – the inaugural grant was available for disbursement. The board selected Most Holy Trinity School in San Jose as the first grant recipient. The grant funded a new math curriculum for the entire school called *Eureka Math*². This program includes traditional math models as well as “digital interactives, increased opportunities for student discourse, and a new level of flexibility to make math instruction exponentially more teachable and engaging.”¹ The teachers are already seeing the positive impacts of these math manipulatives. Stephen Carroll, the middle school teacher, observed, **“Because of this gift, my students will have more opportunities for success. If there are students who aren’t getting [the lesson], the math manipulatives provide a second way for them to access the information.”**

Sara Fogelquist’s legacy will impact children in our community for generations to come.

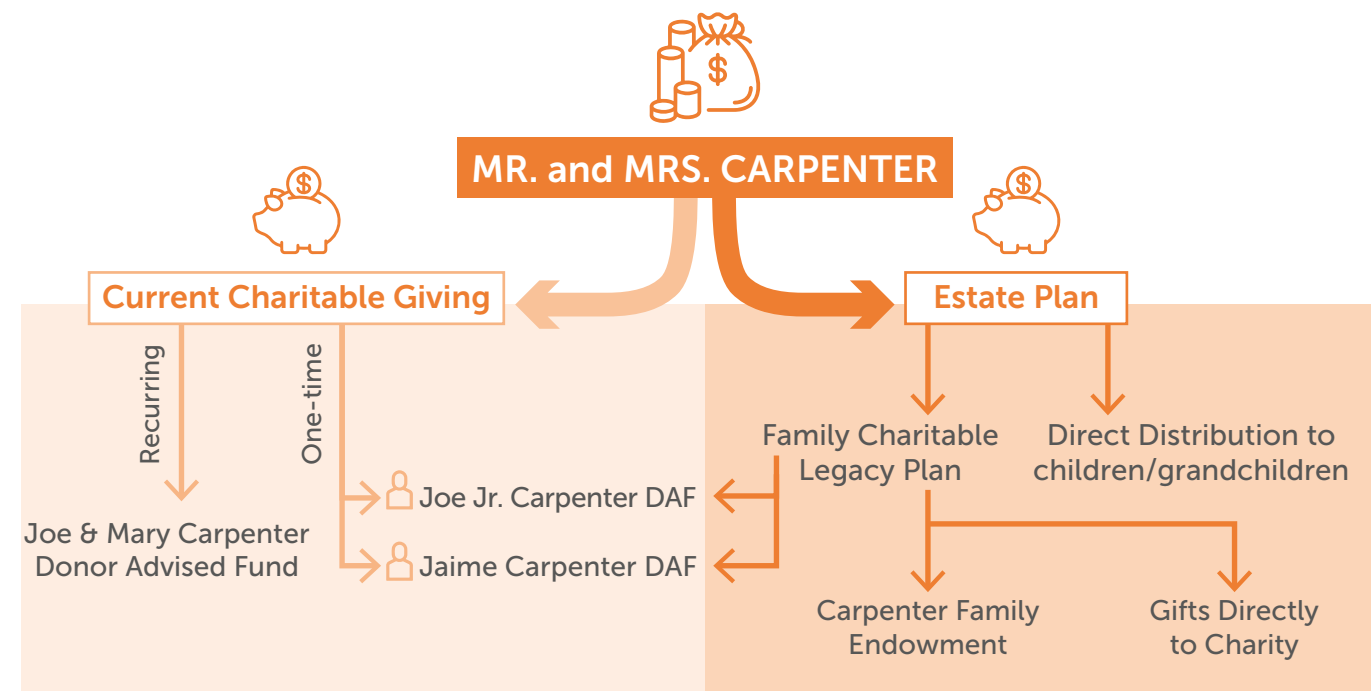


How Can we Get our Children Involved in Philanthropy?

This question was top-of-mind for a family (we’ll call them Mr. & Mrs. Carpenter) who was working with the Foundation. Their children were grown, and the couple had plans for substantial giving both now and through their estate plan. But they were searching for ideas to get their adult children motivated to start giving.

The Foundation discussed various ideas with the couple, and they eventually decided on a plan that is illustrated below. Their plan combines current charitable giving with gifts via their estate plan (which utilize the Foundation’s **Family Charitable Legacy Plan**: catholiccf.org/family-legacy-plan).

To get their children involved in philanthropy, they opened a Donor Advised Fund (DAF) for each of their two children (Joe Jr. and Jaime). A DAF is a vehicle through which donors can give to nonprofits and in which they can grow their money tax-free. The Carpenters opened the two DAFs now and plan to add to each of the funds through their estate plan. These DAFs are solely advised by the children; Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter don’t have any say over where the kids make grants. They simply provided the vehicle and funding as a catalyst for their children’s philanthropy.



The Carpenters use their own Donor Advised Fund for their current giving. They grant to the charities they love from their DAF and replenish the fund routinely. They made one-time gifts to set up DAFs for their children and now the kids can add to and grant from those funds.

The majority of the Carpenters’ estate plan will go directly to their children and grandchildren. They are utilizing our Family Charitable Legacy Plan for the amount they have designated for charity. They have a plan documented with us that says the amounts that will be distributed to the charities and funds of their choosing.

Social Justice Education for the Next Generation of Leaders

Arogyaswami (Paul) Paulraj and his wife Nimi grew up in Catholic families in India where Christians make up about 3% of the population, and Catholics are a smaller percentage still. While most of their friends and some family members did not share their faith, Nimi and Paul grew up learning Christian values from their parents. Paul's sister is a nun in the Salesian Order. The inspiration for the **Paulraj Family Fund for the Catholic Community at Stanford** came from a combination of their faith values and a desire to leave a legacy supporting social justice. At age 15, Paul followed in his father's footsteps and joined the Indian Navy. Throughout his 25-year naval career, Paul made many contributions including developing military sonar systems. Given an opportunity to teach at Stanford, he and his family moved in 1991. Most notable of Paul's many achievements during his 22 years at Stanford is the invention of a breakthrough wireless technology known as MIMO. Soon after arriving, Nimi and Paul became part of the Catholic Community at Stanford. They remain grateful for the dedicated service of the parish staff, and, in particular, the Dominican Fathers and Sisters who have dedicated themselves to this community. The Paulrajs have been active supporters of the parish for many years, and last year they decided to make a larger gift focused on social justice. Social justice has always been important for the Paulrajs and integral to their faith. The glaring disparity between the wealthy and the poor is the focus for their philanthropy. **"I believe that the solution to this inequity lies in building awareness in our young people,"** says Paul. **"Our way of contributing to this effort is to help the next generation of leaders to better understand the many dimensions of this problem."** The goal of the **Paulraj Family Fund** is to support the parish's student programs on these topics. The Paulrajs had a clear vision for how their fund will disburse grants. "We felt that the annual grant from a permanent endowment would not pay out quickly enough," says Paul.

Through conversation with the parish and the Catholic Community Foundation, the Paulrajs created a 30-year term fund. The first grant will be issued in 2023. The fund will continue the legacy of Paul and Nimi at Stanford – a legacy of education, compassion, and faith – for decades to come.

In years when endowments were earning more than that, we granted conservatively and reinvested the excess. In 2022 when endowments experienced investment losses, we were able to continue granting at 4%. 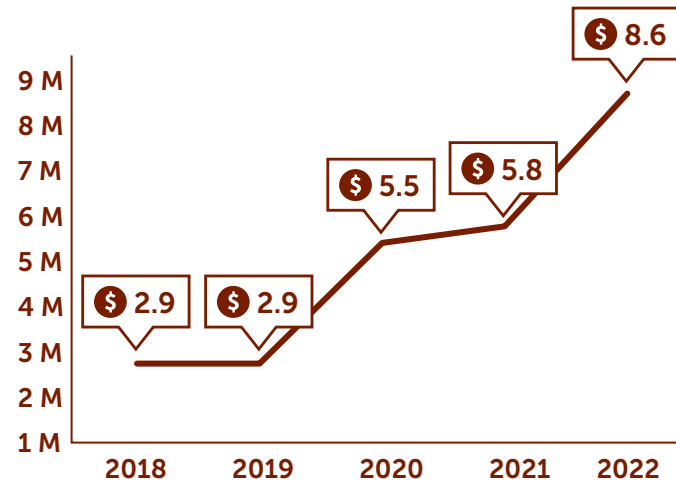

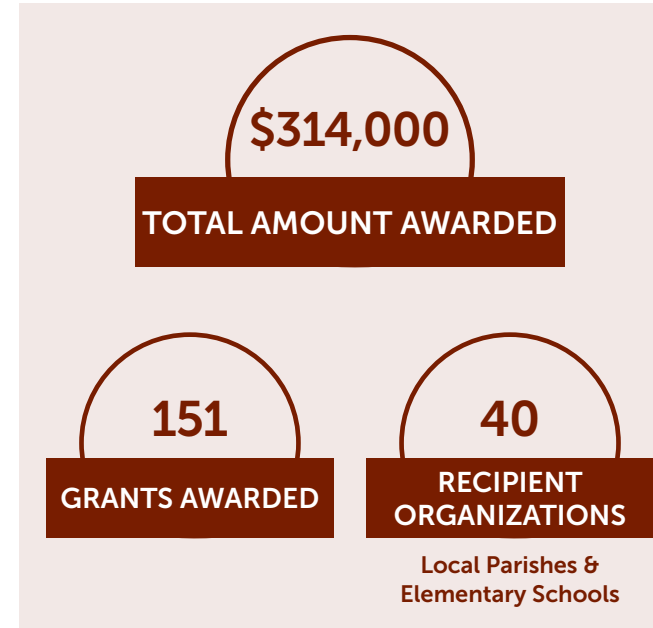

5-Year Granting History



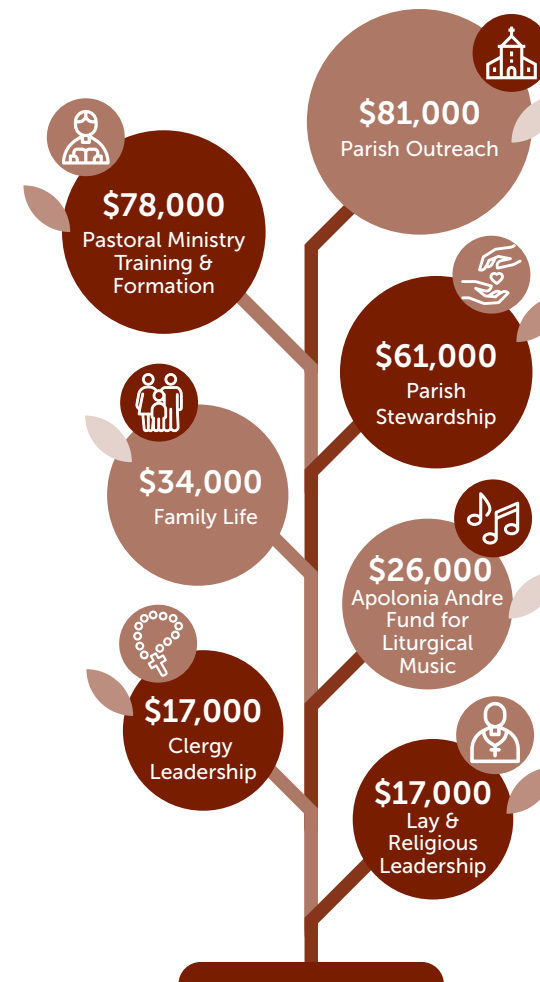

Ministry to Farm Worker Families and Children

Saint Martin of Tours Parish - Parish Outreach Two-Year Grant Recipient

In 2021, Saint Martin of Tours developed a parish-wide program to support Migrant Farm Worker Families. The farm worker community communicated their immediate needs for coats and shoes for adults and children, household hygiene products, and food. This faith-in-action encounter triggered a generous response, assisting approximately 40 families, but limited resources left the needs of other families unmet. In 2022, parishioners stepped up and greatly expanded the program, impacting 277 families with both items to meet immediate needs and additional resources like iPads with hotspots, bicycles, and more. The grant from the Foundation purchased gift certificates for groceries, paid for transportation to Watsonville, and other program costs. They plan to increase the impact in 2023 after the devastating floods which displaced many members of this community.

Stewardship as a Way of Life

2022 Spring Grant Cycle Parish Stewardship Grant - Most Holy Trinity Parish

Most Holy Trinity parish is a community built on volunteer power. This multi-lingual, vibrant community has nine masses each weekend in four languages. They serve more than 300 families and 200 homeless each week through their food distribution and rental assistance program. Their catechism classes serve about 350 students with 100 teachers in Vietnamese and 150 students with 40 teachers in Spanish. Support from parishioners was integral to the recent renovation of the church, and every month a crew of dedicated volunteers beautifies the space. Volunteers are the backbone of all these activities, and more. A culture of stewardship is central to parish life at MHT. In the Foundation's 2022 Spring Grant Cycle, the parish received a grant in the Parish Stewardship category for their programs which engage and thank parish volunteers. The parish offers a welcome program, community building activities, engagement training and more for volunteers.

The parish hopes that through these activities, parishioners will embrace the obligation to be good stewards to the community and actively engage in keeping the spirit of stewardship and gratitude alive in the parish.

"For us at MHT, a heart full of gratitude is a noble and beautiful heart, for it is modeled after God's own heart. Our stewardship program is less about managing our resources and more about giving from our own life, even sometimes giving out of our own poverty, as Jesus emptied himself to the point of death for our salvation."
